## A guide to British bees

Did you know that there are over 250 species of bee in the UK? Use this bee-spotting guide to identify which ones are buzzing around in your garden, local park, or allotment.

> Large species with dark yellow bands at the front of the thorax and middle of the abdomen.

> > BUFF

BOMBUS

Yellow and black

bands and an

orange tail. Small

size. Males also

have yellow facial hair.

BOMBUS PR

Slim, sandy thorax and black abdomen with golden-amber bands.

COMMON CARDER

These big fluffy bees are the only UK species with all-brown (ginger) colouring and no white tail.

NEY FOO TED FLOWE

MANICATUN

Yellow spots along abdomen. Males also have prongs on their rear.

Black with yellowish legs. Males are brown with a pale face and hair plumes on their middle legs.

Identified by their ginger thorax, black abdomen and white tail.

Yellow-black-yellow thorax, a yellow band at the base of the abdomen, and a pure white tail.

### How to create a wildlife haven at home

Around 87% of UK households have a garden. That's over 10 million acres, which is larger than all of Britain's nature reserves combined! Just think of the nature we could attract to these spaces if we all made a change. Even a small increase in bee-friendly organic habitats can boost bee numbers by a third.

No garden? No problem! Try planting in pots, windowsill growing or planting in your local community garden.

Let your lawn grow a little wild Long grass provides a home for nesting butterflies and lets wildflowers flourish, providing nectar for bees and other pollinators.

Make a hedgehog hole Small gaps cut into fences allow creatures to pass from garden to garden, expanding the habitats of garden wildlife.

#### Give help to birds

You can help birds in your garden by adding boxes, baths and feeders to keep birds warm over winter.

#### Say no to pesticides

Pesticides cause serious harm to nature and wildlife. Protect nature by gardening with organic principles in mind.

#### **Construct insect hotels**

These provide a refuge for all kinds of creatures, including bees, beetles and spiders - boosting the biodiversity of outside spaces.
